#### **New starts**

September always feels like a threshold month, doesn't it? Even if our schooldays are long behind us, there's something about the smell of new exercise books, the sight of fresh uniforms and the return of routine after summer that gives the air a sense of beginning again. Schools, colleges and universities fling wide their doors, and thousands of young people find themselves facing both the excitement and the nerves of a new start.

The Bible is full of "new starts". From the very first pages of Genesis, we hear of a God who speaks creation into being and calls it good. Later, when Israel wandered and stumbled, God did not abandon them but renewed covenant after covenant, promising to make all things new. The prophet Isaiah gives us that glorious word: "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43.19).

And at the heart of our faith is the most astonishing new beginning of all – the resurrection of Jesus. Out of despair came hope; out of the tomb came life; out of endings came a new creation. As Paul writes to the Corinthians: "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: the old has gone, the new is here!" (2 Corinthians 5.17).

So September, with its timetables and sharpened pencils, offers us a reminder that God is always the God of fresh starts. That doesn't mean it's easy. New beginnings often bring uncertainty. The first day at school, the first lecture at university or even the first meeting in a new workplace can make us feel rather small. Yet scripture reassures us: we are never alone. Jesus promised, "I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Perhaps this September is a new beginning for you – not necessarily in a classroom, but maybe in the shape of a new challenge, a shift in circumstances or simply a renewed desire to walk more closely with God. Whatever lies ahead, we can step into it trusting that the God who raised Jesus from the dead is also at work in us, breathing life into old bones, making paths through the wilderness and offering new mercies every morning.

So let's pray for all those starting school, college or university this month — and let's also remember that each day, for each of us, can be a holy new start with God.


Entries can be dropped off on Saturday 6th September at 6–8pm, or Sunday 7th at 8–10am. Photographs must be submitted on the Saturday evening.

#### The Blessed Virgin Mary

On 8 September the Church of England celebrates the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It's been part of the Church's liturgical year since the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, when some of the feast-days of the pre-Reformation church that had been axed were added back into the Church of England's annual cycle of celebrations. Archbishop Cranmer, when he drew up the first Book of Common Prayer in 1549, had cut out most of the feast-days that had by then proliferated in the Roman church. For him, this drastic reduction in feast-days was a powerful demonstration that worship in the Church of England was to be radically different from that of Rome. But the Book of Common Prayer as revised in 1662, in a rather different social and religious context, backtracked on that to some extent. Further feasts, festivals and commemorations have been added since, as we can see in *Common Worship*.

In restoring the celebration of the birth of Mary on 8 September, the 1662 Book of Common Prayer was reinstating a tradition that went back a long way. It seems to have begun somewhere in Palestine or Syria early in the sixth century, where there was a strong Marian cult, with many aspects of her life being celebrated in the liturgy. We don't know precisely how the feast of her birth on 8 September spread to the western church, but Pope Sergius I (AD 687–701), who was originally from Syria, was a key figure in promoting Mary's popularity. Papal records note that he produced special prayers for her feasts, although there is no indication that he introduced the feast-days themselves, so we should probably infer that these feast-days were already known in the western church by then. Certainly as Christianity spread in western Europe, the feasts of Mary, including the feast of her birth on 8 September, were well embedded in the standard liturgy. We can see this, for example, from surviving Anglo-Saxon church calendars.

The bible tells us nothing about Mary's life before the Annunciation: all traditions about her, including the name of her parents, come from apocryphal gospels, the earliest and most influential of these, in Mary's case, being the *Protoevangelium of James*, which dates from the latter part of the second century. This – by contrast with many apocryphal gospels from later centuries – is quite a short and sober narrative. It is this text that names Mary's parents as Anna and Joachim, and it describes how Anna, who was barren, gave birth to Mary after she had been visited by an angel who declared, 'The Lord has heard your prayer. You shall conceive and bear. And your offspring shall be spoken of in the whole world'. It's immediately obvious that the story is modelled on the birth narratives in Luke. Anna's name might similarly come from Luke: Anna in the Temple at the Presentation. And since the Hebrew form of Anna is Hannah, another source might be the Old Testament story of Hannah, who was barren before she finally gave birth to Samuel.

The *Protoevangelium* and later apocryphal narratives met a demand for human stories about Jesus's family life. For us the feast-day of the birth of Mary no longer reflects that imaginative interest, but is a date when we can give particular thought to Mary's part in the Incarnation and Redemption.



#### The birds in your garden



At this time of year, I'm often asked why gardens are suddenly empty. From the hustle and bustle and the regular need to top up feeders, to the strange lack of movement in the shrubbery. So where have all the birds gone? As always with bird behaviour there are several reasons.

First, they can't all stay close by — there just isn't enough room, or food. As with most species, not just birds, parents will be encouraging their young to find their own territories and set up home in another area.

Secondly, the end of the breeding season means that males no longer need to attract a mate or defend a territory, so they don't need to sing anymore. That Blackbird sitting at the top of the tree outside your bedroom window at 3am every morning no longer has a reason to waste energy by singing his head off, though a few still do! Once breeding finishes, most birds go their separate ways and, with the exception of species which continue to hold territories, such as Robins and Wrens, songs fall silent.

Thirdly, as birds get towards the end of the breeding season, a lot of garden regulars will enter the moult. This is the time of year when many birds lose their feathers, worn out by incessant dashing about feeding young, and replace them with new ones. Many juvenile birds will also lose their first plumage, ready to emerge as adults. The energy cost of growing a new set of feathers is high, and losing a primary wing feather or two can really make a difference when trying to evade a predator. For this reason, a lot of the birds will lay low, skulking in bushes and hiding in hedges. This is particularly noticeable with Blackbirds, which otherwise seem to be around most of the year.

About half of UK species are migratory, either in the winter or summer, so many will start to head back to their long-term homes in August, too. This includes birds which we have been sharing spaces with, such as Swifts. Swallows and House Martins will stay around until September or October.

There's a chance that birds can disappear from your garden because a predator has moved into the vicinity. A Sparrowhawk may have taken up residence nearby, or a cat may have arrived in the neighbourhood. Birds need to feel safe, so if they think that they will be attacked in your garden they will move away.

Possibly the most important reason for the lack of birds during the summer months, though, is that they simply don't need your garden at this time of year. There is an abundance of berries and seeds in the countryside in the autumn, which provide them with nutrients. Lots of garden birds will head into the countryside to fill up on these widely available calorific treats. House Sparrows, Starlings and many finches like to feed on grain spilt after the harvest, so if you're near farmland, they're likely to be out feasting in the fields. When this annual abundance runs out, usually as November approaches, 'your' birds will be back!
